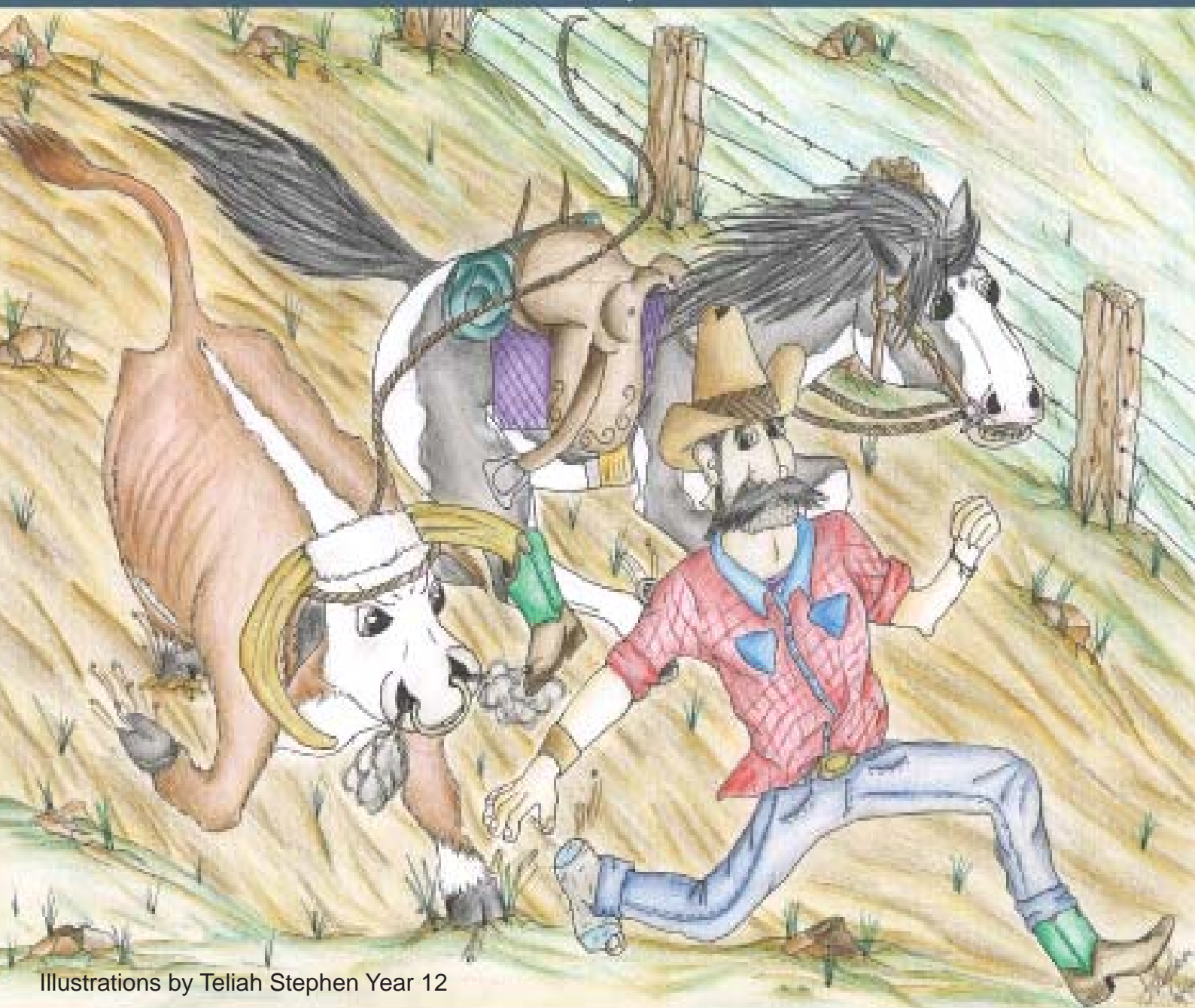

VICE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The year 2013 has been a significant year for the WA College of Agriculture Harvey on a number of levels.

Firstly 2013 marks sixty years of operation of the agricultural college which is quite a milestone. If this was a marriage we would be giving each other diamonds to mark the occasion. Over the past sixty years, the school has gone through several iterations including Harvey Junior High School, Harvey Agricultural Senior High School, Harvey Agricultural College and finally the current WA College of Agriculture Harvey. Those students first educated at the school are now in their mid-seventies! When you consider the numbers of young people educated and trained at the College over the last sixty years and the staff and families who have come and gone, you get some idea of the history and the place that the school holds in the hearts of so many.

The past fifteen or so years have probably seen most change in the College in terms of faculties, programs and ethos. This was helped in no small part by the splitting of the College from the Harvey Senior High School which enabled the College to determine its own identity and future.

The second milestone is that 2013 marks the first full year in the new Wokalup facilities. There have been so many positives to shifting to the new facilities not the least of which has been students having their own individual rooms and the opportunity for them to all have their own space to retreat to in the hubbub of a boarding school. The opportunity for staff to communicate easily on the one site and develop a more consistent approach has also been highly beneficial from a school organisational perspective.

Shifting into the new premises was a logistical challenge last year but this year the challenge has been in developing processes and systems in living, learning and working in the new facility. Many of the processes we had in place at the old site needed revising and updating given our new circumstance. This is still a work in progress but we are getting there. One initiative that we started this year was the Positive Behaviour Support Process which provides a common framework and language for behaviours in an effort to encourage positive and discourage negative behaviours.

This year we have had some challenges with staff leaving in the class area but this has been more than compensated by some new and enthusiastic staff. Next year we will have in place new Maths and English teachers as well as new staff in the Design and Technology area. New staff bring fresh ideas and perspectives to our school and in doing so improve the way we operate.

The range of successes this year were helped by a great group of Year 12's and in particular the TER group who set a terrific model for their fellow students. I cannot remember seeing a group of students more positive, supportive of each other and enthusiastic about their education than these. I thank the whole staff for their endeavours and commitment over the year and wish our whole College family a safe and festive Christmas break.

REVIEW OF THE COLLEGE BOARD ACTIVITY IN 2013



Following the granting of Independent Public Schools (IPS) status to the College it was necessary to wind up the School Council and form an Interim School Board which occurred towards the end of 2012. The membership of the Interim board was laid down in the School Education Act 1999, School Education Regulations 2000 and the individual Board's constitution. The Act determines the means by which Board members are appointed and the process of election nominating those specific areas from which members are to be drawn.

Our Board members were elected at the meeting of 1 March 2013 represented by the School Captain(s), Ryan O'Neil and Stuart Rae, two elected parents of current students, Mrs Janine Thornton and Mrs Marianne Bombara. The Principal, Mr Neale Armstrong and two elected staff members, Mr Stephen Watt and Mr Dean Pfitzner. Three members of the community, Mr Ray Blackburn, Mr Vaughan Byrd and Mr Roy Forbes, one of which must be a member of the Agricultural Advisory Committee (preferably the Chairman). In addition we have the opportunity to co-opt members as necessary and currently the Business Manager Mrs Teresa Hickman and Secretary Sue Howell, are extremely useful and supportive members. This gives us a maximum number of voting members of nine, which was approved by the board at the meeting on 28 June 2013. It was believed that the smaller number would prove to be more efficient in the decision making process.

The purpose of the Board is fundamentally to enable parents and community members to engage in activities that are in the best interests of students and will enhance the education provided by the College.

The operation of the Board is well regulated by the Education Department through the various guidelines provided after achieving IPS status.

The role of the Board is to:

- Overview the College's objectives, priorities and directions developed by the Principal and staff.
- Review the financial planning necessary to fund the objectives, priorities and directions.
- To evaluate the College performance compared to the Key Performance Indicators (KPI).
- Promote the College in the community.
- Approve Budgets and Contribution and Charges.

The Board cannot intervene in the management or control of the College or the educational instruction of the students, that is the role of the Principal and staff. There have been six meetings of the Board during 2013 and the same number are planned for 2014.

The changes that have occurred have provided some interesting challenges for the Board and this year has been a steep learning curve for all members. I am pleased to say that every one of the members and the co-opted members have operated in a very professional manner and been supportive in finding the way through the hitherto untrodden path of operating as a Board. As Chairman I am indebted to each and every one for their commitment to the task and for their generous support in assisting me to perform my role. On the basis of this year I can see continued improvement in the effectiveness of the Board for next year and in the years to come. My sincere thanks to them all and to the College support staff working behind the scenes.

I wish the College staff and students a formative and successful year in 2014.

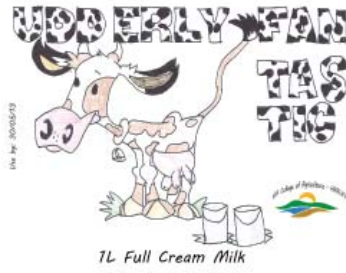
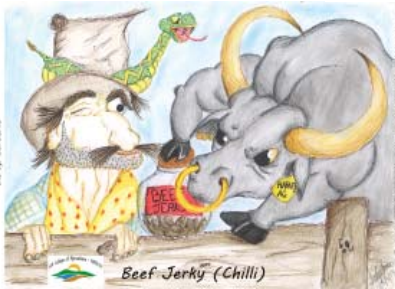
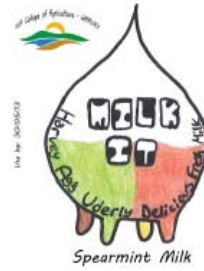

NATIONAL MERINO CHALLENGE IN DUBBO

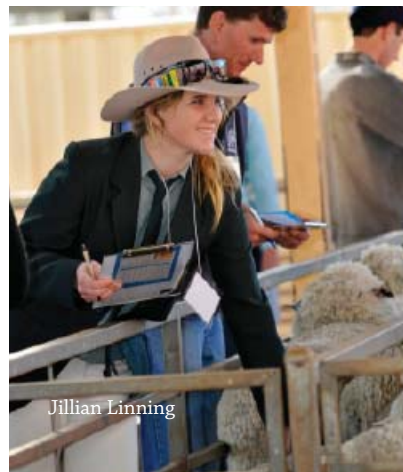

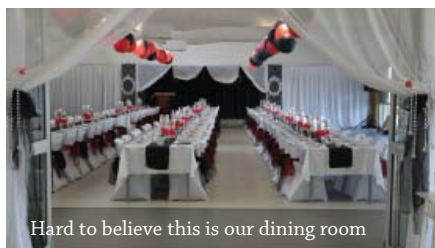
COLLEGE DINNER

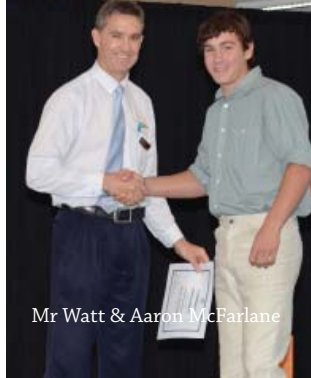

On Monday the 18th of February, Year 11 and 12 Animal Production Systems students took a bus trip to Serpentine to learn from Glendale Gelbvieh stud owner Michelle Flemming. The cattle yards are situated under lovely, old, shady trees, which provided the perfect cool setting to take in everything on offer.

Students were provided with the opportunity to assess two well developed 2 year old bulls and make comments on their strengths and weaknesses. Michelle then went on to critique the bulls as to what she thought of their structure and conformation in her opinion as a successful beef producer and exhibitor.

There were also younger bulls which had recently been halter broken, as well as some heifers, including a black Gelbvieh heifer. Some of the students had not seen Gelbvieh (pr Gelb vee) cattle before, so the breed sparked interest due to its docile temperament, softness of skin and developed muscling. We were fortunate enough to also be able to view Red Angus and Brahman cattle which Michelle has at her property.

The excursion was a valuable learning experience, with a huge amount of information learnt about Gelbviehs, Red Angus, beef production and beef cattle judging. FIRST AID FOR ALL NEW STUDENTS

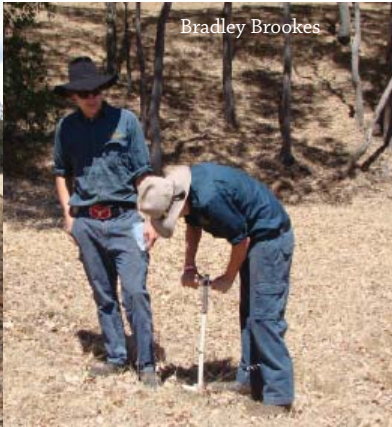
Each year, part of the new students' induction into the College is for them to obtain their First Aid Certificate. This course is run over two days with students sitting their theory test at the end of the second day.

YEAR 10 & 11 ALCOA EXCURSION



On the 26th of March the Year 10 and 11 TER classes went to Alcoa located at Willowdale. The teachers who took us were Mr Gann and Mrs Boyhan. We started at Willowdale, which is the main mine, then worked our way to Dwellingup, up through to Pinjarra.

At the Willowdale mine site we met two educational officers named Ronda and Emma, who were with us throughout the tour and explained how Alcoa works. Alcoa employs 4000 people and runs 24/7, mining bauxite. From the bauxite they extract alumina. They lease 7,129 square kilometres of land which started in 1961.

There were huge trucks taking loads of bauxite to the crusher, where it is eventually crushed so that it fits onto a conveyor belt and moves down to the refinery. The crusher is huge and costs an enormous amount of money to build.

After looking around the main mine, we headed to Dwellingup where the nursery is situated. We stopped for lunch, before looking around at the plants and seeds. There are over 200 species of native flora within the nursery. Alcoa rehabilitate 650 hectares of land by pre-ripping and clearing, seeding, fertilising and planting the flora. The entire process can cost up to \$25 million.

Alcoa recycles 60% of the trees to a company that uses it to fuel coal. Alcoa provide many jobs and give young people apprenticeships and opportunities.

On the way home we stopped at Logues Brook Dam to have a look around. Thanks to the teachers, it was a great day.

YR 12 UWA FUTURE FARM - PINGELLY



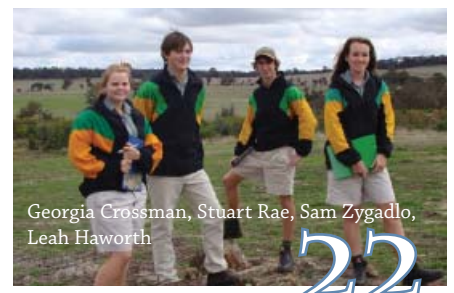
A group of Year 12 TER students visited the UWA Future Farm in West Pingelly to view the farm as it is conducting an experiment on the effect of consumption of a native fodder plant by goats on methane emissions. This is an ever increasing concern with global warming and an issue that UWA Future Farm is researching. The researcher is hoping to find positive links between the ingestion of this native fodder plant and a reduction in methane emissions.

The Cashmere Flock at the Future Farm 2050 has the highest genetic merit for cashmere in Australia and provides diversity for both farming and research. Goats provide good weed control, which is important in the context of chemical weed control and herbicide resistance, have good 'emissions efficiency' (that is, kg methane per kg product) thus meeting our clean and green values, as well as providing cashmere fibre and capretto.

YR 12 TER HYDROPONICS CAPSICUM FARM TOUR

Recently the Year 12 TER group visited a hydroponics capsicum farm in the hills above Kelmscott. TopCaps capsicums has about half a hectare under hothouses and grows around five tonnes of capsicums each week. Andrew and Bronwyn chose capsicums because they are hard to grow and most capsicums are imported in to WA from interstate and overseas. They figure that there is less competition so they can have a better go in the industry. The capsicums are grown in an environment where the temperature, humidity and sunlight are closely controlled to ensure the plants get the right amount of stress to make them fruit but not too much that they stop growing. It's a real knife edge operation where getting it wrong can have disastrous consequences.



Nutrient is supplied in precise quantities in the water supply and there is no pollution of soil or water supplies. A high quality and reliable water supply is essential for the operation and any power interruption means that irrigation pumps can't operate and the plants quickly become water stressed. This type of farming has lots to contribute towards sustainable food production as the farmers estimate they get up to 10 times the product compared to field grown capsicums. Also, because of a smaller land requirement, hydroponics can operate closer to population centres meaning easier access to labour and less transport for product. Combine this with little chance of pollution, little need for pest control chemicals and high productivity.

On the same day the group also visited C Wise composting at Pinjarra and were amazed at the way they recycle carbon from all sorts of sources including; piggery waste, human waste, dead chooks, sawdust. From potentially polluting waste products, C Wise can produce something which enriches the soil, supplies nutrients and enhances soil biological activity. How clever is that! Compost is sold to vineyards and vegetable growers as well as broad acre cereal growers who are trialling the use of pelletised compost drilled with the seed. One of the highlights for some of the group was watching the transformer compost mixing machine in action.

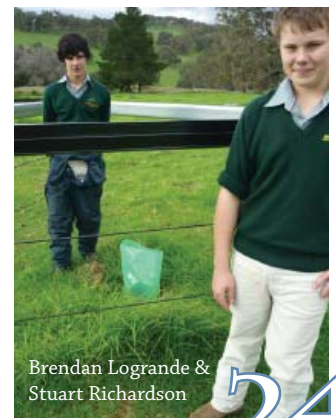

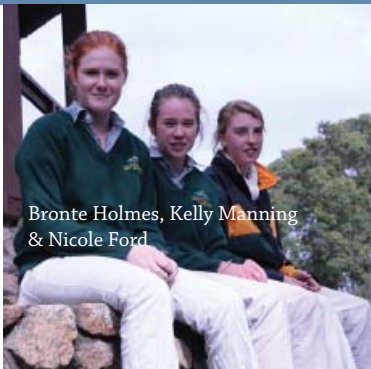

YR 10 MANJIMUP EXCURSION- CAREERS' DAY

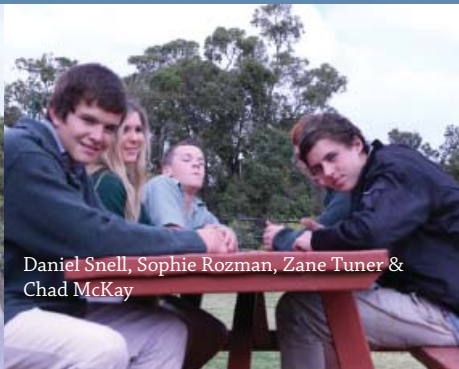
Mr Watt took a group of our Year 10 students down to the Manjimup Horticultural Research Station for the Department of Agriculture and Food's Careers Day.

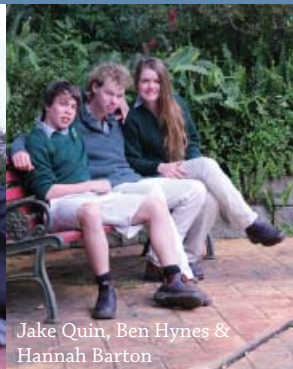

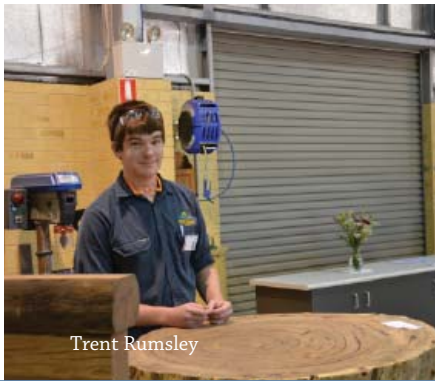

FARM



FARM REPORT



2013 has been an exciting year as we look back and reflect on the College operation which is now on the one site at Wokalup. From a student perspective, there may be some misgivings leaving the Harvey site, however this has faded over time and it appears everyone has embraced the new campus. From a farm staff perspective, the move of all College facilities to Wokalup has also taken readjustment after 13 years of detachment from Harvey. The management of students, administration and consolidated catering arrangements have resulted in significant efficiencies being achieved now we are all on one site.

This year the College farm has experienced a “normal” amount of rainfall which long term records indicate is about 950mm p.a. It is ironic to hear people complaining about the prolonged wet conditions when really this is what the Harvey district normally received before climate change had its influence. The excellent pastures and fodder this year have made livestock management relatively simple, however saleyard, milk, wool and citrus prices have remained static. This remains one of the biggest challenges to our students entering the agribusiness industry in being able to remain viable with static prices and increasing costs of production.

The qualification achievement rate for farm related certificates is the highest the Year 12 cohort has seen for a long time. All Year 12 students were successful in attaining Certificate II in Agriculture, 12 Year students have attained Certificate II in Wool Handling, 1 student attained Certificate II in Horticulture and 1 attained Certificate II in Shearing. This is a direct reflection on student application and commitment by Technical Officers. Congratulations to everyone. Some new initiatives for next year include the delivery of units specific to Equine and Meat Processing.

Two new farm enterprises commenced at Wokalup in 2013. The construction of 8 new horse paddocks early in the year provided a base from which the equine section could operate. Additional infrastructure and resources will be allocated to this area next year as interest in Equine grows. The donation of 3 breeding mares (and a riding hack) has facilitated some “fast tracking” of plans to introduce an Australian Stock Horse breeding programme. The College also cranked up an ecoshelter to fatten pigs after 6 years of recess from grunter production.

2013 was the first year the College introduced the concept of running farm hubs rather than individual farm sections. This appeared to work well in improving student outcomes and providing homes for beef, dairy, horticulture, equine, sheep and intensive agriculture from which to operate.

At the beginning of the year the College employed a Certificate III trainee, Daryl McDonald, who provided a lot of assistance to staff and students. Additionally Mr Rhys Morrissey was employed to assist in sheep and equine. Mr Sachse and Ms Valli had to take extended time off due to illness/injury however the College managed to keep most bases covered, which didn't compromise student learning. Mr Davies was employed in Term 4 and was involved in many building projects.

A highlight of the 2013 has been the level of student participation in a wide range of farm related activities. Success at Wagin Woolorama and the Perth Royal Show were notable together with a third and fourth placing in the Farm Skills events. Cattle Club participation was excellent and Mr Gelmi should be acknowledged for his outstanding contribution to this activity and exhibiting at various agricultural shows. Off site training involving students in artificial insemination and shearing tuition at Rylington Park, the Cattle Assessment School and Youth Cattle Handlers' Camp were valuable learning opportunities taken up by Harvey Ag students.

Through astute financial management and income generation on the College farm, the College has been able to establish reserves for specific projects at the Wokalup site. At the end of 2013 approx \$500 000 of building projects will commence to compliment the College and farm operations. In particular, the Chemical Shed, Dairy Feed and Shade Shed, Amenities Shed and Multi- purpose Farm Shed are “buildings” which are scheduled for construction in early 2014. A vat shed has also been built.

Two additional farm utes, a skid steer loader, a new sidewinder feeder, crutching cradle/sheep handler and power harrows for the horticultural section are some assets which have been acquired by the farm to assist with commercial and educational outcomes.

The Graduating Class of 2013 have been a terrific group of young men and women who have remained positive throughout their time at the College. On behalf of all the farm and other College staff, we congratulate you on your success and achievements to date and hope you enjoy great careers in the future. Remember what the WA College of Agriculture - Harvey has done for you and never forget to come back and visit us in the future.

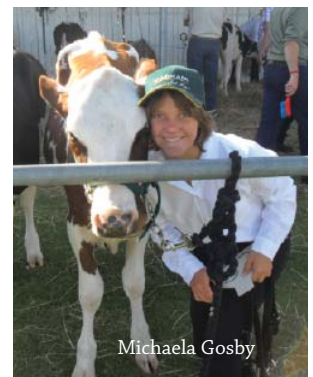

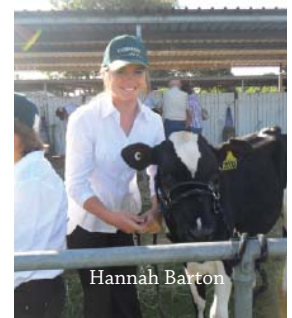

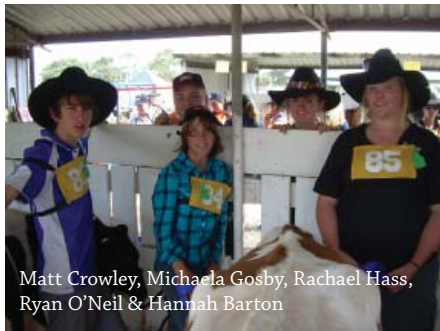
NATURAL HORSEMANSHIP CLINIC

This year's Perth Royal Show was a very successful show for both students and the College cattle. All students competing in all areas did the College proud.



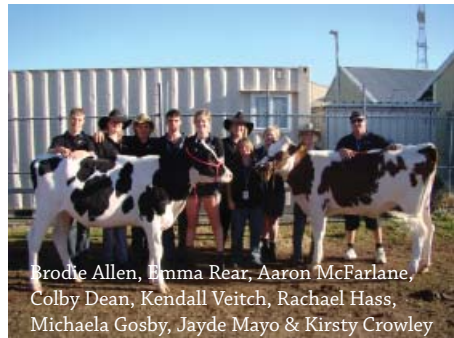

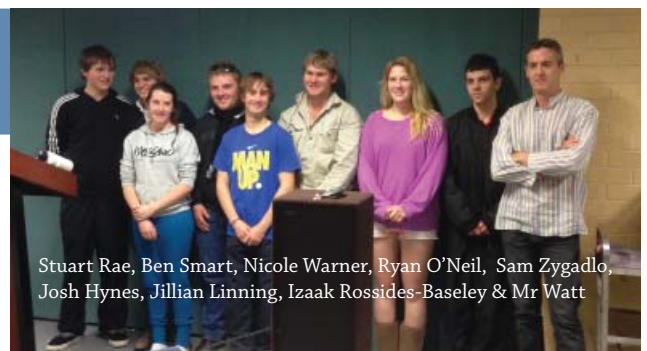
QUIZ NIGHT

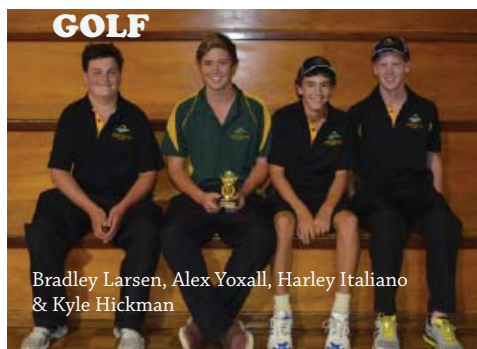

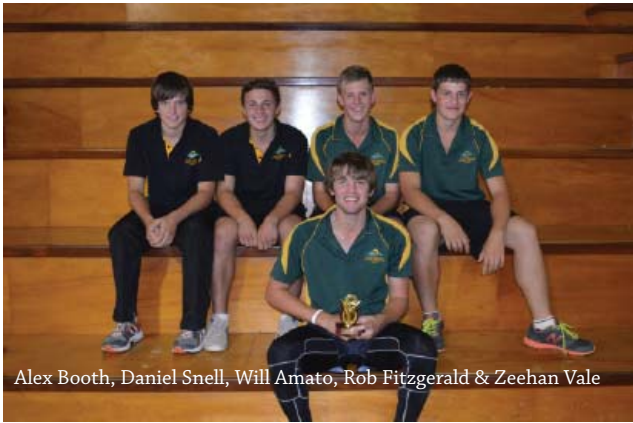

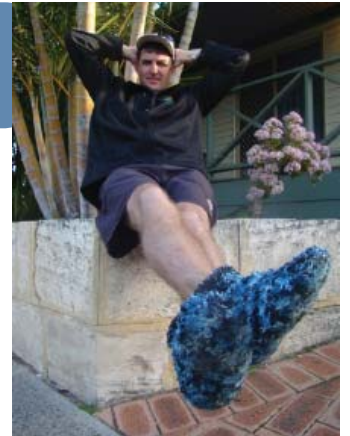
Boys' Basketball

YEAR 10 OUTDOOR ED



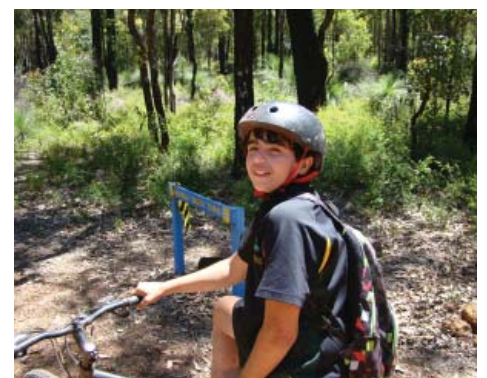
