HEAD OF DEPARTMENT'S REPORT

Dear Parents

Second term has again been one of the busiest periods of the year. I never cease to be amazed at the huge range of activities and educational opportunities placed before students at the Agricultural School.

Within the first week, 48 year 12 Geography students from Penrhos visited the school and had a BBQ with our students. The next night was the School Ball, which was held at the Lighthouse Inn, Bunbury.

COUNTRY WEEK (JULY 4 - 8)

Students have been active in fundraising for Country Week all term. Sheep manure sales, car washes and raffles had a great number of the students out and about raising in the order of \$2500.

Ms Akkari has been busily organising Work Experience for Year 12's not attending Country Week. Students will work for a number of employers including farmers, mechanics, engineering works and government authorities. This is an invaluable opportunity for all students and hopefully enables them to make job contacts.

During Country Week, Harvey will exchange several students with students from Morawa Agricultural District High School. Agricultural Training Officer, Mr Rod Trigwell and students Jade Hilzinger (Yr 12), Michael Stocks, Gordon Mullins and Ben McDonald (Yr 11's) will visit Morawa. The aim of the exchange is to expose interested students to another agricultural area and introduce them to new people and work conditions. Morawa students will involve themselves in milking cows, picking mandarins and a host of other jobs around the Harvey Agricultural School Farm.

SCHOOL VISITS

Mr Webster has been busy visiting other schools with information on our Agricultural School for students that may be interested in enrolling next year.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

It is pleasing to report that with only a few exceptions, student behaviour has generally been very good. There has been a few occasions where staff have needed to contact parents regarding their sons/daughters behaviour. Parental

support has been excellent and greatly assisted in turning bad behaviour into good.

Parents are asked to note comments on behaviour, in the Residential Report. Your assistance in counselling your son/daughter will assist us in curbing any future behavioural problems.

SICKNESS

Over the term a number of students have been absent. Clearly, parents understand that a note of explanation or medical certificate is mandatory. Absences without a note may affect eligibility for Austudy or other benefits.

Where a student does not submit work or is absent for tests or practical activities it becomes difficult for the student to catch up. Teachers will assist in every way possible. **Catching up on work is the students responsibility.**

HORTICULTURAL SKILLS 1995

Laura Akkari, Paul Egerton-Green and myself have been investigating implementation of a new course next year. The Certificate of Horticultural Skills (Level 1) is fully accredited and currently being trialled at TAFE and Curtin University.

Students with an interest in Horticulture will gain both a theoretical and practical knowledge in horticulture. Students studying the subject will have access to higher level Horticultural Practice at TAFE.

REPORTING

At the end of Semester, students will receive a report which details student performance in all subjects. The reports are put together with comments and grades for each SEA subject studied by your son or daughter. The grades which are shown on the report are not final grades. Final grades are given at the end of the year to the Secondary Education Authority who issues the **Certificate of Secondary Education** at the end of Year 12. The grades which are received mid year are predictions made by teachers of the grade your son or daughter is likely to be awarded at the end of the year given their current level of achievement continues until the end of the academic year.

The Residential Report gives parents feedback on their sons/daughters progress at Harvey. Parents are requested to complete the comment slip and return it early in Term 3.

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

We have the services of the School Psychologist, Mrs Grania Talemaitoga. Grania visits the school every Friday afternoon and is available to discuss any concerns of study - vocational - personal nature. Students can request an appointment with Grania by contacting the front office.

Similarly we have the services from the School Nurse 7.45 - 8.00 am weekdays only. Mr Jeff Christie may refer students to the Doctor where necessary, otherwise applies first aid or offers counselling of various sorts. As a result of the "Quit" workshop that Jeff recently ran, one or two students have seen him for programmes in giving up smoking.



SPECIAL REQUEST TO PARENTS

1. DRESS REQUIREMENTS





FARM REPORT

Recently we purchased 5 Ha of land (including a residence) adjacent to the farm, to increase the area available for night grazing of the dairy herd.

Joe McGree from Smorgon Cyclone was involved in a number of practical fencing demonstrations with the students, as new boundary and subdivision fences were needed on the newly purchased block.

We have been invited to supply fruit for an export contract to Asia. We are select picking our Imperial mandarins at the moment to meet this order. The crop this year is quite heavy, but we have sustained some losses as a result of the heavy rains.

Plans have been finalised in conjunction with the Herd Improvement Service of W.A. for Artificial Insemination courses to be made available to Year 12 students. There will be two courses this year, the first commencing on August 10 and finishing August 12 and the second commencing August 17 and finishing August 19. Any Year 12 student wishing to learn how to artificially inseminate dairy or beef cattle is invited to participate. It is hoped that the cost per student will be \$75, but it could be more depending on the number of students who participate.

There have been some temporary changes in farm staff in recent weeks. The Farm Supervisor, Paul Egerton-Green is on Long Service Leave and the Assistant Farm Supervisor, Lyndon Patroni has been on sick leave. In their absence I have been acting as Farm Supervisor and Ellis Foster has been acting Assistant Farm Supervisor.

SCHOOL PROMOTIONS

AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES ARE ONE OF EDUCATIONS BEST KEPT SECRETS.

Every year I visit nearly every school in the South West and a number of selected metropolitan schools to speak to students about agricultural education in general and about what Harvey has to offer in particular.

Audiences range from a handful of students over lunch time, a whole year group of nearly 200 Year 10's in the school gym or a careers night with over a thousand people attending.

I always begin my presentation with the same question to my audience, "What do you know about Agricultural Education?" Occasionally there is a brother or a sister of a past or present student in the group and they are able to suggest some of the activities and educational opportunities we can offer. Generally students and teaching staff know very little about what goes on at Agricultural Schools.

I try to give a balanced view of what it is like at Harvey Agricultural School. I speak about the excellent opportunity for a practical education and explain the major differences between spending Year 11 & 12 at an agricultural school and an upper school education at a standard senior high school.

I tell prospective students about our longer working day, weekend work, compulsory supervised prep, bed at 9.30 pm and getting up at 5.00 am for dairy roster. I always get a student reaction when I tell them about the "points" system and being "gated".

Where appropriate I take current students back to their old schools to assist me and to invite questions from their peers; this has been particularly successful at careers nights.

Agricultural schools are still an unknown in the education world, but if enquiries to the school for information from prospective students are any criteria for judgement someone has started to leak the information.
