## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Another term has ended and I must thank all our staff and students for their very productive work. Next term is a very full and busy one with Farmers' Dinner, Field Days, Year 12 Work Experience, A.I., Computing and Shearing courses as well as all the normal work to be done in class and on farm, so I hope everyone has a restful holiday and recharges their batteries for the onslaught.

### Excursion Policy

I would like to bring to parents' attention a new Education Department Excursion Policy which requires schools to obtain written parent permission for students to attend excursions, and authority for teachers to obtain medical assistance in the event of an accident or emergency if parents cannot be contacted. Being a residential school, students often go on outings, and rather than send home notes each time this occurs, I will be composing a letter and permission form that will cover most of the kinds of activities students participate in at Harvey. This will be sent home to parents early next term to be signed and returned.

We also need to update our medical information on students and so will send a medical details form home at the same time. Your co-operation in completing this would be much appreciated.

### Daylight Rule

An issue I would like to seek parent opinion on is the school's "24 hour daylight" policy regarding student relationships. Basically this means that there has to be daylight between male

and female students at all times - holding hands or touching is not allowed.

We have had a request from some of our students that the daylight policy be relaxed to allow the holding of hands. The Staff have discussed this but have not resolved the issue because it is a difficult one for supervisors. Relationships are bound to develop between students of 16 and 17, and there would be no problem if they were returning home each day. The duty of care staff have, for students in a residential situation is a big responsibility and the question is, where does one draw the line? Is it an appropriate thing for students to hold hands in a school environment?

How do you feel, as a parent, about this? Are you aware of whether your son/daughter has formed a romantic relationship at school? Would you want to be informed?

We would appreciate your responses to this matter on the slip provided.

### A Well Earned Rest

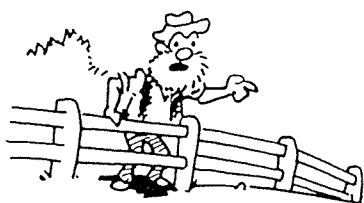

Term 2 saw many pleasing achievements in our school, some of which I will reflect on quickly.

### Pasture Plant Study Group

Several students including Nadine Hoeberigs (Casuarina), Kent Rochester (Many Peaks), Darrell Scott (Yallingup), Andrew Ponsford (Baldivis) and Lyndal Hayes (Byford) are growing a large number of pasture grasses and legumes in trays. Students will use the plants for Year 12 Crops and Pastures, but more importantly it will be part of the South West Regional display at the Royal Show. Our 140mm's of rain followed by fine sunny weather has been a bonus for the growth of the plants.

### Launch & Tour

On Friday May 19 the Hon. Peter Foss as Minister for the Environment, launched a catchment strategy for the Leschenault Water System. Mr Whittock along with Shannon Osborne (Waroona), Erin Dickson (Kelmscott), Andrew Dunnet (Nannup), Craig Warburton (Brunswick) and Jessica Welsh

(Kelmscott) attended the opening ceremony and visited several properties involved in promoting the ideals of the catchment plan. Harvey students will become more involved in the catchment work for this area.

### Led Steer

Students spend a significant amount of their after school time preparing the steers. Animals will be shown at the Royal and Brunswick Shows later this year.

## Reports

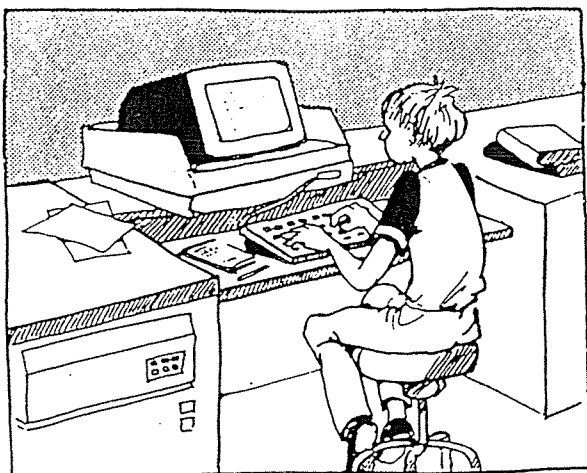

## Library & Computers

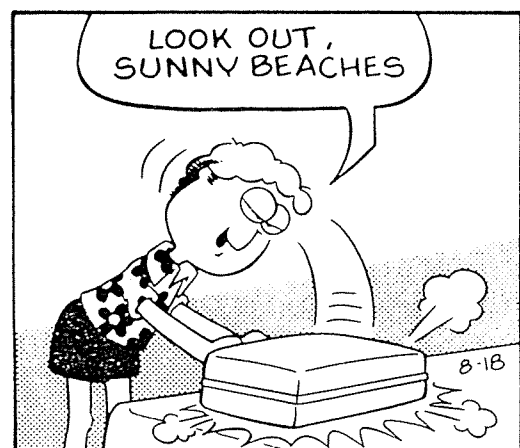

## AUSTUDY APPEALS

Are you unhappy about an Austudy decision and want to appeal against it?

The Social Security Appeals Tribunal hears student appeals and is keen to inform students of their appeal rights. It aims to provide an appeal system which is fair, just, economical and quick. The Tribunal is independent from the Department of Education, Employment and Training (DEET).

The Tribunal hears appeals on the range of allowances administered by DEET including basic Austudy, student homeless rate, education supplement, Abstudy and the assistance for isolated children scheme. For example, the Tribunal can review a DEET decision not to pay Austudy or to raise an overpayment.

The Tribunal also hears appeals about Department of Social Security decisions in relation to benefits and pensions.

Appealing to the SSAT costs nothing. To help applicants get to the hearing, the Tribunal will pay reasonable travel expenses. If needed, an interpreter is provided. Where a student cannot attend, a hearing can be by conference telephone or in rare cases, heard on the papers.

The main purpose of the informal hearing is to hear why the student is not happy with the decision. Students attend alone or with a parent or friend and speak to the Tribunal. A written submission is not necessary, although some students find notes or a submission helpful.

The Tribunal may change the original decision, vary it or agree with the decision.

The Tribunal may only review decisions already reviewed by an Authorised Review Officer in DEET. Appeals should be lodged within three months of the DEET review.

Appeal forms are available from Student Assistance Centres (in the phone book under "Employment"), or from the Tribunal - 9th Floor, London House, 216 St George's Terrace, Perth. Appeals may also be lodged by ringing the SSAT on 261 3360 or 1800 011 140 (Freecall number).

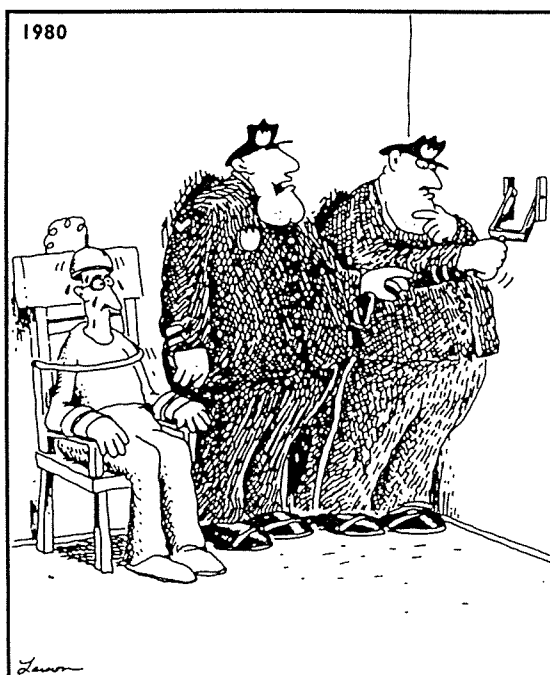

Second Term has nearly gone, with some rain, but not nearly enough to fill the dams, let alone have sufficient for irrigation next season.

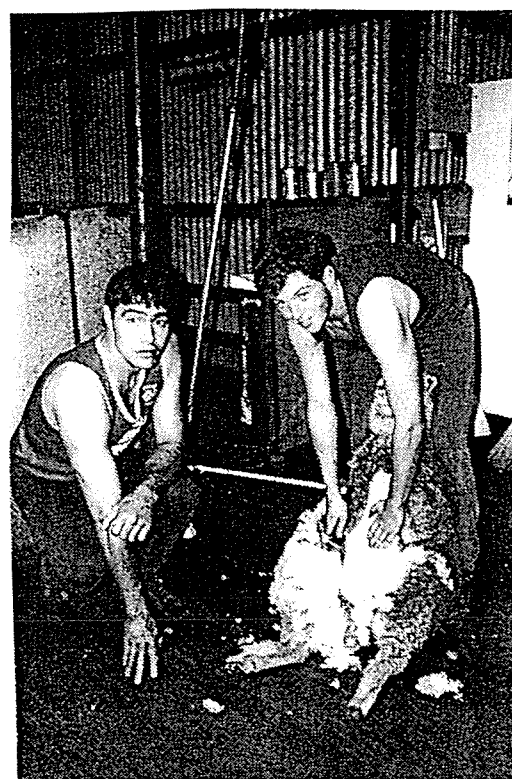
This term has been a steady term with farm based learning and instruction taking place.

*Peter Black instructing Darrell Scott*

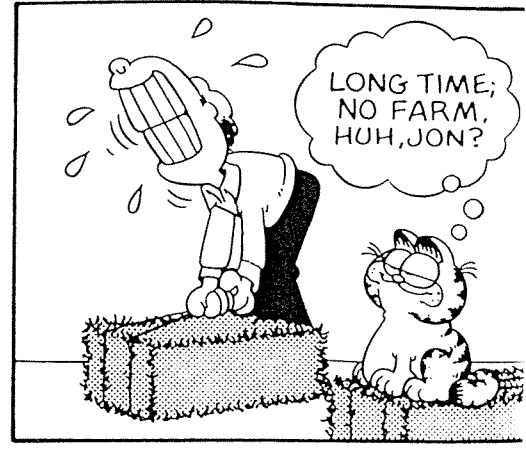
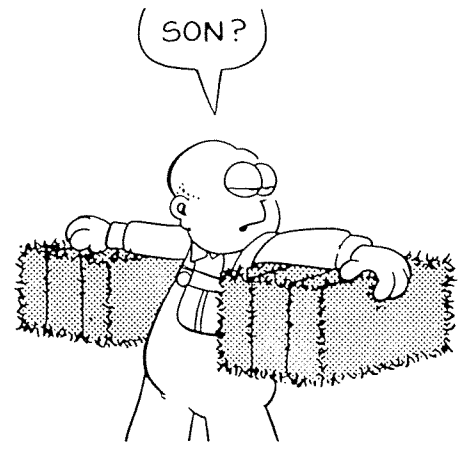

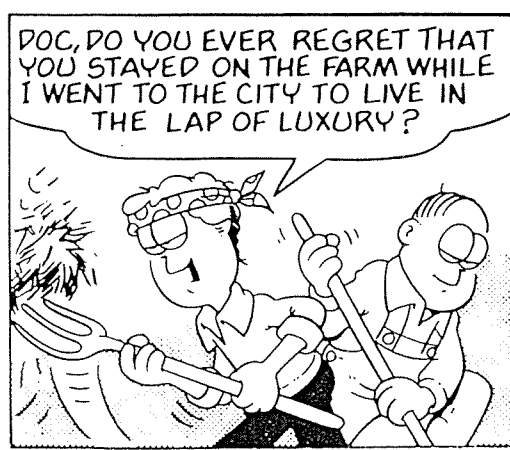
Royal Show on the 27th September where we will field a team to compete.

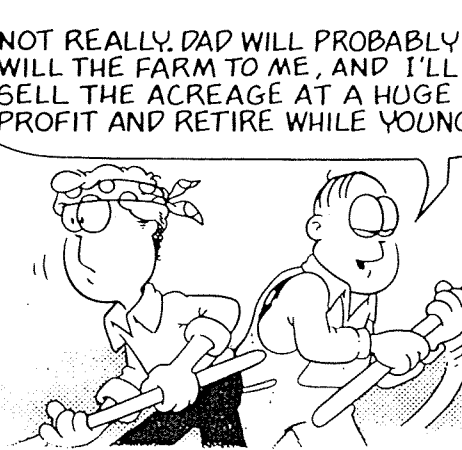

# Minister runs the gauntlet



**FEDERAL Finance Minister Kim Beazley** ran the gauntlet on the Harvey River bridge recently. The bridge, which does not have a pedestrian footbridge, is used regularly by Agricultural Campus students and tourists to gain access to the southern tourist precinct and to town. For many years the Harvey

Senior High School has pushed for a safer river crossing for its students to no avail. But all that is to change with the recent \$115,000 Federal tourism grant to the Harvey Shire Council. Part of the funding will be directed towards the provision of a footbridge across the river.

# Local initiative started school

WITH the Harvey Senior High School's Agricultural Wing Old Boys Association growing in strength, research has been done on how the agricultural wing was started.

The late Gladys Offer, of Benger, had a vision to utilise all Harvey's interment camp buildings which lay idle since the end of the second World War. It occurred to Mrs Offer that this would make an ideal place for an agricultural school.

There was also so much land for expansion and it was in a central area.

Her main reason for promoting the school was because WA did not have an agricultural school in an irrigation area.

Wheatbelt schools Muresk, Narrogin and Denmark were in

regions climatically different to Harvey.

She believed the region needed a school to cater for the needs of irrigation farming.

Mrs Offer decided to call a meeting in Harvey involving organisations such as the Farmers Union, CWA, P&C and the Agricultural Societies in the region.

The group represented the region from Dardanup to Pinjarra and more than 80 people attended including the late Iven Manning, MLA, and Mr C. Henning, MLC.

After Mrs Offer outlined the reasons for calling the meeting a motion was supported to send a deputation to the then Minister for Agriculture, Mr Garnet Wood MLA.

Mrs Offer was appointed deputation leader with Mrs R. Lawe of Waroona and Mrs P. Depiazzi of Dardanup accompanying her.

The group received a favourable hearing and consequently the school opened in 1953 in the interment camp buildings.

Mr H. Barton became the inaugural principal and there were 18 boarders.

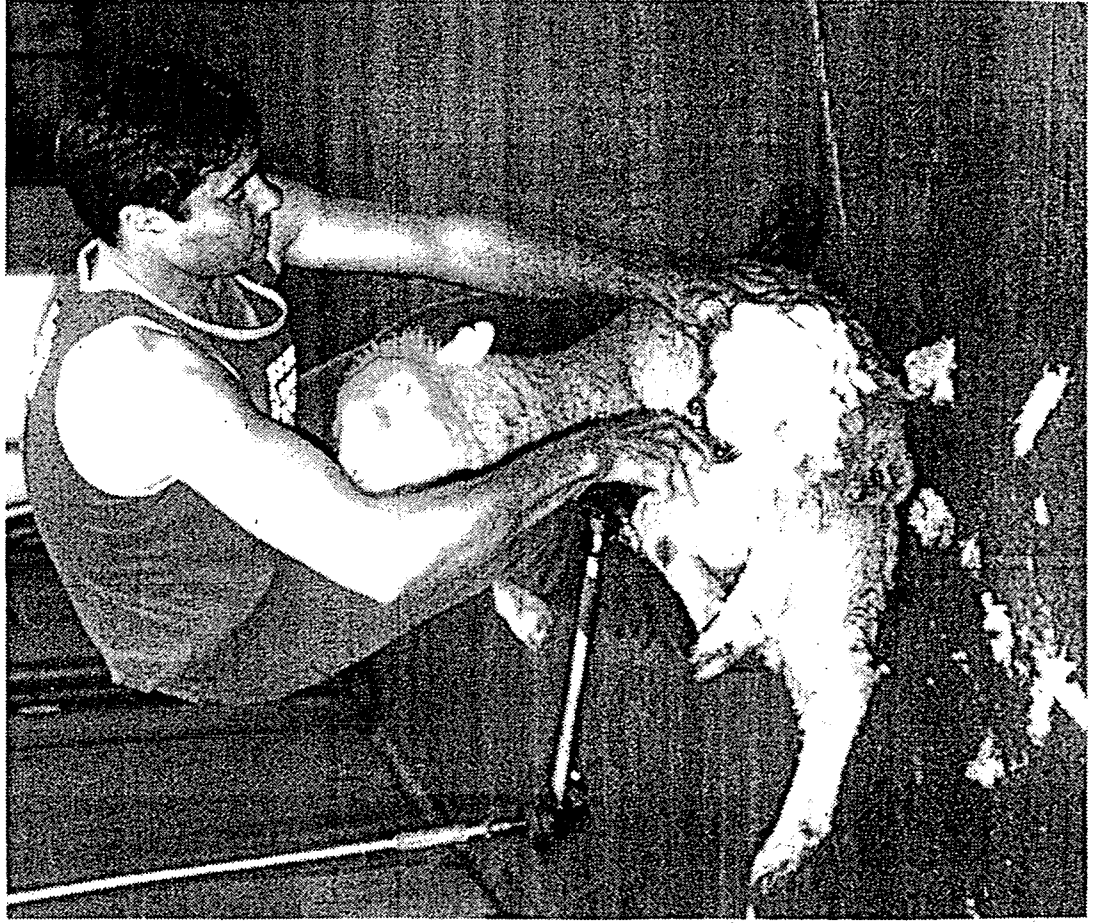
Mr Barton later went on to become superintendent of agricultural schools.

The high school was built 31 years ago, and the two schools now run very efficiently under their first woman principal, Suzanne Saunders.

From Mrs Offer's vision has grown a first-class agricultural campus accommodating both boys and girls from many areas of the State.



# World's top shearer shows skill to kids

WORLD record holding shearer Dion Morrell visited the Harvey Senior High School's agricultural campus last Wednesday.

He was brought to the school by the Australian Wool Corporation's senior shearing instructor Peter Black.

Students were given a demonstration of what it takes when the world record holder de-vooured three sheep in as many minutes.

Three of the agricultural school's top students were then given hands-on instruction from both Dion Morrell and Peter Black, followed by a question and answer session and video presentation.

Morrell pushed 716 sheep out the porthole in nine hours at a New Zealand South Island woolshed on February 1, beating the previous world record by 14 — an average of 45 seconds per sheep.

The 31-year-old West Australian who holds three world shearing records says his February record will be his last.

Peter Black provided technical support for Morrell during the record run.

Mr Black says visits to agricultural schools and colleges such as last Wednesday's could become a thing of the past.

Government policy has dictated that the Wool Corporation no longer become involved with shearer training.

The Government is to take over this role, but Mr Black is concerned that the training will suffer because it will not be industry generated.

"Governments have their own priorities which are not always in the best interests of the industry," he said.

"They say that training should be at the entry point but we have focussed 75 per cent of our attention on the professionals because of the quality concerns we have in the industry.

"It is a contradiction to say on the one hand that we need to improve quality and then take training away from industry control on the other.

"It is all well and good to provide shearer's courses for young unemployed, but how many of them will stick at it when they experience shearers' work conditions.

"At least when we come to the agricultural schools and colleges the students are all keen to take it on seriously.

"Bringing people like Dion Morrell to the schools helps to inspire the students to improve themselves.

"I don't believe this sort of thing will happen when the Government takes over in December."

Mr Black said he was really concerned because he had been a part of the industry all his life and believed training was heading in the wrong direction.
