### From the Principal

Dear Parents, Staff and Students,

Another very full school year is over and hopefully, by the time you receive this newsletter, most of you will be starting to enjoy some rest and relaxation. Students and staff have had a very busy time of late and deserve to put their feet up for a while.

As I reflect on the many achievements of the school and its community, I feel very proud to have been associated with HASHS for the past three years. I said my farewells in the last newsletter, but I would like to reiterate that I will always have very fond and treasured memories of my time here.

### The New Boss

Mr Garry Bamford has gained promotion to the position of Principal at HASHS



for 1998 and beyond. Garry is currently Assistant Principal at Warnboro Community High School and will bring with him a great deal of experience and expertise in the areas of technology across the curriculum and student outcome statements. He has been to visit the school and is looking forward to taking up his post here.

I am sure all our staff, students and parents will make him very welcome and I wish him the happy and rewarding experience that I have had at Harvey.

### Other Changes

As I foreshadowed earlier, there will be a restructuring of the management of the Town and Agricultural Campuses, with a separate Principal appointed to the Agricultural Campus some time in Term 1 1998. A Local Merit Selection process will be conducted, which means that there will be local representation on the selection panel. Dr Bastow has approached the Farm Advisory Council to ask one of these gentlemen to be a panel member. This will help the school select someone suited to its ethos.

In the meantime, some other arrangements have had to be put in place to ensure a smooth start to the school year for both campuses. The following staff changes will thus be occurring:

- **Mr Neale Armstrong** will be Acting Deputy Principal at the Ag Campus for Term 1
- **Mr Ossie Hardy** will be Acting Deputy Principal at the Town Campus
- **Mr Greg Prosser** will be Acting Head of Department, Social Studies.

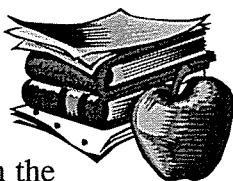
I must thank these staff members for their interest and willingness to take on these roles, and I know they will execute their duties most competently.

### **School Priorities for 1998**

While our School Development Plan is not completely finished yet, it has been discussed in detail with the School Management Council at two meetings over the past month, and the following priorities have been endorsed for 1998:

#### **1. Curriculum Improvement**

With major changes about to occur in the curriculum delivered to students, it has been seen as most important that time and resources be allocated to allowing staff to work with the new curriculum framework and investigate student centred learning and a more outcomes based approach. The school's strong emphasis on improving literacy outcomes in students will be continued under this banner, which will incorporate the following major programs:



- Literacy/ Numeracy – Stepping Out strategies, Reading Enhancement Program (GALRAB), Primary Transition.
- Outcomes-based Education – in each Learning Area
- Academic Extension Program
- Vocational Education and Training Program which will incorporate Structured work-based Learning.

#### **2. Technology Across the Curriculum**

Work already begun this year will be continued, but the following will be features of this priority:



- Establishment of an Information Technology Coordinator to assist staff and monitor student outcomes
- Professional development of staff in the latest technology
- Enhanced Internet and email access for students and staff
- Establishment of a Learning Technologies Plan for the school.

#### **3. The Learning Environment**

This priority is concerned with ensuring the most positive learning environment we can for students and will incorporate the following:

- Establishment of an MSB Coordinator to ensure a fair and consistent system of rewards and discipline occurs
- Development of Students at Risk Strategies so that students with learning difficulties can be assisted appropriately
- Whole school harassment policy to be developed to ensure that the frequency and severity of bullying and other anti-social behaviours are reduced.

Copies of the School Development Plan, with details of student performance in all learning areas of the school, and of the improvement plans for 1998, will be provided to School Management Council and P&C members early in the school year. Parents may obtain a copy if they wish by ringing or visiting the school.

### **Utilities Savings = New Furniture**

I am pleased to report that due to savings of approximately \$10,000 in electricity, water, gas and telecommunications this year, we have been able to allocate funds to the repair of desks, the purchase of new chairs for 3 classrooms and new desks for 1 classroom. A plan has now been put in place to replace more furniture over the next few years.

At our final assembly for the year on 12 December we acknowledged the achievements of many students in Years 8 to 11.

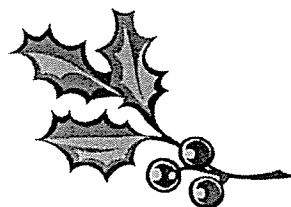

## Ode to Mrs Saunders.

On the 17<sup>th</sup> December while most of the students are already on holidays, and many of the teachers are planning theirs, Harvey Agricultural Senior High School will witness the departure of one of its most popular and successful Principals: Mrs Suzanne Saunders.

She began her teaching career in 1972 at John Forrest Senior High School as a teacher of English, having obtained her qualifications in English and French from the University of Sydney a few years before. She spent some 5 years there before transferring to Lockridge in 1977 continuing to teach in the English area until 1980 when, through her outstanding classroom work, she secured a position as the Head of Department (English) at Geraldton Senior High School. Whilst in Geraldton, she inaugurated a most successful professional development and networking group for teachers of English in the region.

At the end of 1983, Mrs Saunders was faced with the difficult position, like many of us, of having to balance family and career aspirations, choosing to retrogress and accompany her husband 'Val' to the Pilbara. From September 1983 until the end of 1986, Mrs Saunders worked as a part time teacher and full time mother, when the system re-promoted her to Head of Department at Hedland SHS.

Within two years, she was again promoted, this time to Deputy Principal at Port Hedland and her achievements included the developing of a vertical timetable for the unit curriculum, and the setting up of an off site 'Learning Centre' for students at educational risk - a highly successful programme.

At the end of 1990, Mrs Saunders transferred to Karratha SHS as the Deputy Principal, and acted as Principal for 3 terms in 1993.

She took long service leave through the second half of 1994, and whilst travelling through Europe, at a chateau in the South of

France, did a phone interview for the Principal's position at the Harvey Ag. SHS.

Fortunately for us, she won this position and I'm sure wondered what had hit her when she arrived, having to manage two complex sites, the Agricultural Campus and a Senior High School.

Amongst her achievements during her three years in Harvey, she has initiated the Students at Risk programme, improved the self esteem of all staff working at the school, enhanced a culture of parents and staff working together, overseen the promulgation of the highly successful vocational programme of Structured Workbased Learning at the Senior High School, and thus given the school a direction and purpose for its community for the turn of the century.

In the arena of Agricultural Education, Mrs Saunders has made a huge impact. As the first Female Principal of an Agricultural Campus, she showed her vision and drive in steadily working towards the inauguration of what in 1998 will be the independent Harvey Agricultural College and set the wheels in motion for the long term future of that school.

Mrs Saunders is noted by all for her sensitivity and flair when dealing with staff or parent issues, and her tireless work both in and out of school hours. Such dedication is a wonderful example to the rest of the school community as most can only **hope** to achieve this level of excellence and degree of commitment.

In November this year, Mrs Saunders was nominated by the P & C Association as their outstanding Principal. Being a joint winner from all other Principals in the state says enough in itself. CONGRATULATIONS!

In 1998, Mrs Saunders will take up the position of Principal of Bunbury Senior High School. I know I speak for everyone when we wish her the best for her new position, Bunbury, and thank her for her input into the students of Harvey Agricultural SHS. The

Bunbury Senior High School is not only getting an OUSTANDING PRINCIPAL, but an OUSTANDING PERSON as well. Farewell!

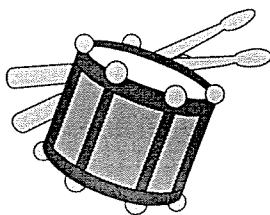


The students were asked to make an instrument where you could change the pitch, loudness and the quality of the musical note. Such instruments included guitars, milo drums, reticulation harps and many more.

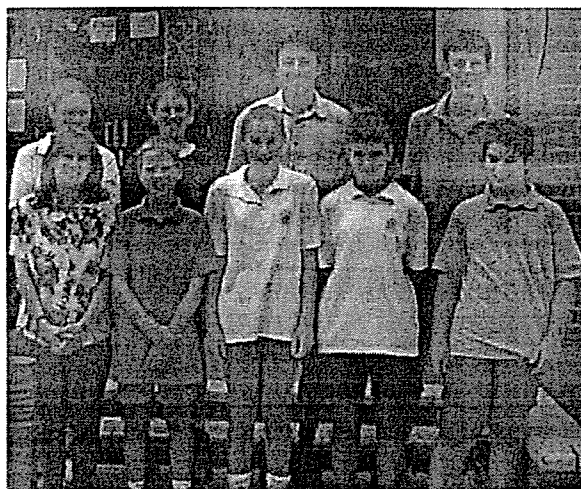


## Year 8 English Academic Extension

## Business Education News

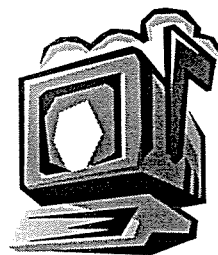

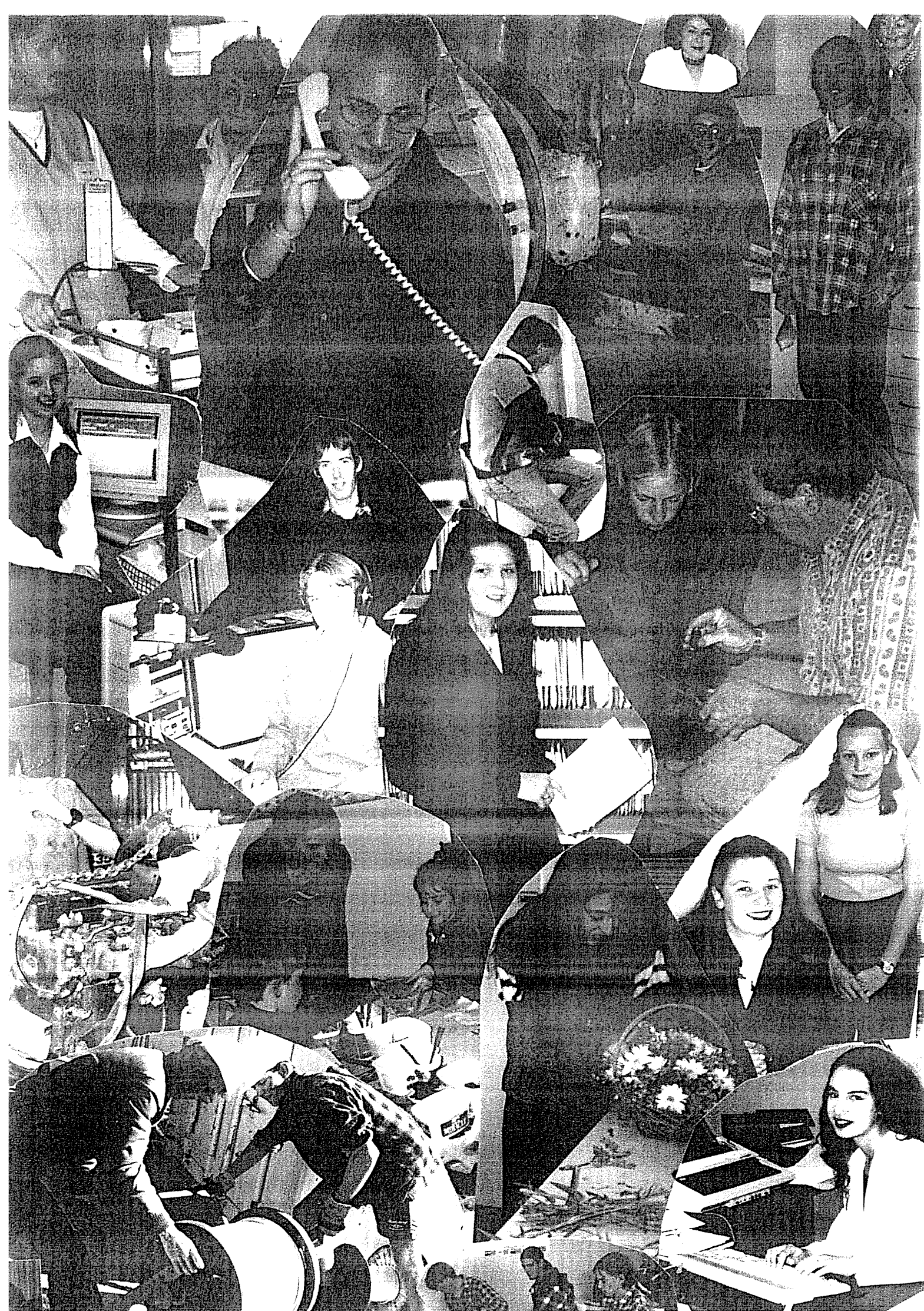
