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8. ADVISORY COMMITTEES

8.1 Present Policy

8.1.1 Membership

At present, it is generally accepted that Advisory Committees comprise any number of members, this being determined by the Committee itself, but all personally invited by the Minister for Education for a three year term. This is renewed by invitation, each three years, with the consent of the member.

8.1.2 Vacancies

To fill a vacancy due to resignation or to increase strength it is usual for a Committee to nominate a person. For some time it was the practice to nominate a few names to permit the Hon. Minister to select and invite. This resulted in considerable correspondence should the person not accept the invitation. Currently, the committee having decided upon a nomination, it ensures the person will accept before requesting the Minister to issue his invitation.

8.1.3 Meetings

Committees mostly meet once a month at a regular day and time. The Principal is Chairman and a person who is not a member may be coopted as Secretary. The Farm Supervisor is not a member, but may attend by invitation of the committee, either regularly or to discuss his report.

8.1.4 Agenda

The usual pattern of Advisory Committee meetings is

- Welcome and apologies
- Report of previous meeting (which would have been circulated)
- Business arising from previous meeting
- Correspondence
- Reports
 - 1. by Principal
 - 2. by Farm Supervisor
- Discussion of reports
- General Business

8.1.5 Function

Advisory Committees were proposed by the Underwood Report to advise the Minister on all matters affecting the welfare and progress of the school. However, in two decades of existence, committees have mainly made recommendations to the Principal regarding the conduct of farming operations. The instances are few, where committees have been greatly involved in school matters although currently some committees are very interested in urgently required buildings for their schools.

8.1.6 Conduct of Meetings

The conduct of meetings is informal and it is not usual that members be called upon to vote upon motions. Rather the business is handled by discussion and resolution avoiding any tendency to divide members on any controversial issue.

8.1.7 Minutes

Minutes are kept more in the nature of a report and therefore record what has been discussed.

Copies of the minutes of each meeting should be forwarded to the Education Department, a copy for Departmental files and marked

plus a copy for the Superintendent and one for the Education Officer, Mr Waterhouse.

8.1.8 Appreciation

The achievements of Advisory Committees have been remarkable. Principals should endeavour to accord them every respect and appreciation possible especially when the opportunity occurs to do so publicly. They should receive invitations to all school functions and especially on agricultural occasions be regarded as privileged guests.

At every meeting they should be offered the hospitality of the school with a specially arranged meal appropriately served and the Principal should explain their presence and function to the students. It would also be appropriate that at each such occasion an advisory committee member have the opportunity to speak to the boys on the value of the training they are receiving, if one so wishes, of course.

It is usual to mount a special annual function, probably a dinner is most appropriate, to extend the courtesy and appreciation of the school to Committee, farmers, business men and their ladies who have assisted the agricultural school. Departmental senior officers would certainly endeavour to attend such functions.

8.2 The History of the Agricultural Advisory Committees

In February 1949 the Minister for Agriculture appointed a Committee to inquire into and report on the current system of agricultural education in Western Australia and to advise him upon means for its improvement.

The Committee, Chaired by Professor E J Underwood, presented its report to the Ministers for Agriculture and Education in November 1950 and the recommendations for the Schools of Agriculture which are shown elsewhere included the following item,

"(vi) Advisory Committees: Advisory Committees should be appointed for each school, containing representatives from the Education Department, the Agricultural Department, the Faculty of Agriculture of the University of Western Australia, the Royal Agricultural Society, together with a prominent farmer from each district. These committees would have the responsibility of advising the Minister for Education through the Director of Education on all matters affecting the welfare and progress of the schools and would help ensure a better link with advances in agricultural knowledge and practice than exists at present, particularly at Narrogin."

From the Education Department's Annual Report of 1952 comes this statement:

"Following the report issued by the Committee on Agricultural Education (Chairman, Professor E J Underwood), a new policy was determined. In future, a local Advisory Committee composed of representatives of the Education Department, the Department of Agriculture and selected farmers of the district will be created for each school to advise the Department on the general policy of the school with which it is associated. This will ensure a closer collaboration between the Department and the farming community in the conduct of Schools of Agriculture."

On 15th April 1953 the Headmaster of the just opened Harvey Agricultural Junior High School, Mr J H Barton, wrote to the Director, Dr Robertson, that he would like to nominate an Advisory Committee for his school saying,

"The new school has now progressed to such a stage as to make the formation of an Advisory Committee a matter of considerable importance."

The Minister (File 485/53) thought "a panel of names should be submitted to him from which he will select a suitable representative." And so on 31st July 1953 the Harvey Advisory Committee constituted with the Headmaster as Chairman, a Department of Agriculture representative, Mr George Gauntlett, and three farmers Messrs F Byrd, J M Clifton and E K Cooling.

On 8th June 1953, the Headmaster of the newly amalgamated Denmark Agricultural Junior High School, Mr John Tulloch (for twenty years previously Science Master at Muresk Agricultural College) wrote, *"I recommend the appointment of Messrs F C Smith, W Bradford and W Middleton to the Advisory Committee"*. (File 1058-53): to be followed on 31st July by letters of invitation from the Minister, Hon. E Nulsen, to these gentlemen.

And so the Annual Report of 1953 noted

"Local Advisory Committees comprised of representatives of the Department of Education and Agriculture and selected farmers of the district have been established at Harvey and Denmark and these committees are proving valuable both for the advice they give and for the splendid cooperation they win from local farmers who make their properties available for the training of the students."

The 1954 Report stated,

"The local Advisory Committees comprised of representatives of the Department of Education and Agriculture and selected farmers of the district and attached to the various schools continue to function smoothly. Early in the new year a similar committee will be constituted as an auxiliary to the Narrogin Agricultural High School."

On 2nd May 1955 the Director of Education received the Headmaster of Narrogin High School's recommendations for an Advisory Committee for the Agricultural School. They were Hon. A L Loton, Messrs P D Moore, W G McDonald, C G Russell and H A Trefort with a Department of Agriculture representative who at the time was Mr T E McDowell, now Assistant Director. The Deputy Headmaster, Mr P D Cullen and the Farm Manager, Mr H F Ritchie also received invitations from the Hon. Minister.

The committee convened on the 10th June 1955 at 10 am. In the afternoon there was a farm inspection which produced *"condemnation of the dormitories, the kitchen and the single men's quarters"*.

Soon afterwards Mr Loton requested and was supplied with a balance sheet as at 31.3.54, a statement of revenue and expenditure at 31.3.54, stock returns and staff lists, designations and wages. The committee was clearly at work.

In December, the Director requested Messrs Cullen and Ritchie not to attend committee meetings and Mr Barton was appointed Acting Chairman.

In 1956 Mr P D Carter of Williams joined the Committee.

By 1956 Narrogin reported,

"During the year the Advisory Council has proved of considerable value and through their enthusiasm, knowledge and untiring efforts, the members have not only assisted the Education Department, but have shown that such an active body has an essential function in the future of agricultural education."

On 13th October, 1958, Mr Barton wrote, "With the establishment of the Agricultural Wing at Cunderdin, it is desirable that an Advisory Committee, similar to that at Narrogin, be appointed." The Hon. Minister was pleased to invite Messrs S A Lundy, A J Jasper and L M Solomon to meet with the Superintendent to act as a provisional advisory committee until a Headmaster was appointed and establishment of the school was in progress.

On Monday 22nd December the Principal-elect of the school, Mr G Sherriff, Messrs Barton and Yates, Mr Shier and White (Dept of Agriculture) and the committee met to formulate policy for the new school.

In April 1960 Mr Barton indicated to the Director that development at the school had been very pleasing and that a proper Advisory Committee now be appointed. Thus Messrs K Burges, R G Mussared and A R Uppill were added to the existing committee with the Shire Clerk as permanently coopted executive officer.

This committee served unaltered until 1966 when two original members in Messrs Jasper and Solomon retired.

The nineteen fifties therefore saw the new pattern of residential agricultural wings attached to adjacent high schools established. The Advisory Committees played a vital role in the development of the four residential Wings and continue to give valuable support in the conduct of the now well developed properties.

The nineteen sixties saw the appointment of several Advisory Committees with a very different agricultural role. These Committees were appointed to schools with agricultural land available, to be developed against possible future needs as a residential school or the more immediate requirements of agricultural instruction for day students. Theirs was a developmental role. Some committees commenced with virgin Crown land. Some had a care and maintenance role. But all were given a less constrained management role than in the four residential schools. Such freedom would have been unreal unless it involved financial management, particularly in matters concerning live stock. And so it was that at Mount Barker, in December 1961 after some negotiation, that it was decided with Treasury approval, to lease the properties to the Advisory Committees at Wyalkatchem and

Mount Barker. The report of this decision is given in full.

"Details of discussion with Mr Barton, Superintendent of
Agricultural Education on proposed establishment of Agriculture
Education facilities at country centres

There are three centres where action is being taken to provide facilities for this type of education, namely at Wyalkatchem, Mount Barker and Cunderdin.

At Wyalkatchem and Mount Barker it is proposed that the activity be undertaken on Crown land under the control of the Education Department.

The schemes will be conducted by local committees the Principal of the school being Chairman.

The committees will accept responsibility for the development of 200 acres at Wyalkatchem and 233 acres at Mount Barker and it is intended that profits be utilised in the purchase of Agriculture Buildings and Plant with approval of Department for use on the properties which, at the completion of the scheme, would be handed over to the school.

Briefly the scheme would be somewhat similar to the activities of an ordinary branch of the Parents and Citizens Association.

Mr Barton considers the suggestion, that a nominal lease rental for the property be charged, is quite satisfactory but considers that the figure should not be more than £ 5 - £10 per annum.

In the conduct of these proposals it is suggested that all funds could be handled by the committee and kept in a separate bank account in the name of the committee to be drawn on by the Chairman and one other member.

In the case of Cunderdin a share farming agreement has been entered into between the Hon. Minister for Education and a local farmer under which part of that farmers property is to be farmed by local farmers in co-operation with the school.

The assets of the school will be used and a hire charge is to be made. Fuel etc. will be supplied by the school and the cost recouped from the proceeds of the farming activities.

In this case it is suggested that all proceeds be credited to Education Revenue and the net profit from the undertaking be utilised in the purchase of school amenities and perhaps an annual bonus of say £20 to £25, depending on the amount of funds available, be paid to the scholars taking part in the scheme.

Expenditure could be charged against the Agricultural Education Vote and be authorised by the Superintendent of Agricultural Education.

6th December 1961"

Cunderdin was at this time conducting share farming arrangements on a piece of leased land.

These leasing arrangements, an annual rental of one peppercorn at Mount Barker and five pounds at Wyalkatchem were not continued with at other schools and the formal agreements ceased. However early in 1970, the Chief Administrative Officer drew the attention of the Deputy Director-General to the fact that developing agricultural wings managed by properly constituted advisory committees were in fact adopting the procedures used by Mt Barker and Wyalkatchem and retaining profits in local funds. These were at Kojonup, Margaret River, Morawa, Esperance and Manjimup.

The Treasury ruled that all but the residential wings could adopt the type of management procedures approved at Mount Barker and Wyalkatchem in 1961. The full report follows:

"On 6th May 1970 a meeting was held at the Treasury Department between officers of the Treasury and Education Departments.

*Present: Mr L E S McCarrey, Deputy Under Treasurer
Mr H Hewitt, Administrative Officer, Treasury
Mr H Barton, Deputy Director-General of Education
Mr J West, Superintendent, Agricultural Education
Mr T W Carmody, Chief Administrative Officer
Education Department*

Mr Barton stated that the purpose of meeting the Treasury Officers was to explain developments in Agricultural Education in the past ten years and to seek guidance as to whether the method of accounting was in order so far as the Treasury was concerned.

He explained that the residential schools at Narrogin, Harvey, Cunderdin and Denmark all operated wholly through the Consolidated Revenue Fund. Provision was made on the Annual Estimates for expenditure and all Revenue was accounted for through the same fund. There was no problem so far as these schools were concerned.

Mr Barton then mentioned the three other types of agricultural schools conducted by his Department:-

- 1. Residential Agricultural Schools for Aboriginal Boys - Gnowangerup, Mogumber and Tardun.*
- 2. Day Instruction Agricultural Wings - Kojonup, Margaret River, Morawa and Mount Barker.*
- 3. Developing School Farms under Advisory Committees - Esperance, Manjimup and Wyalkatchem.*

He stated that with these schools the farming activities have reached varying degrees of development - Mount Barker at quite a sophisticated stage and Esperance in its initial stages.

However there was a common pattern with the three types of schools:

1. The Hon. Minister for Education had appointed Agricultural Advisory Committees for each school. The Committee members were comprised, in the main, of local experienced farmers.
2. Working in conjunction with the Head of the school they advised on farming operations and developmental projects.
3. In many cases material assistance had been provided through the Committee by way of finance, the provision of equipment, etc.
4. The Education Department through budgeted C.R.F. Expenditure, and some Loan Funds, had provided buildings, fencing, machinery, animals and other items of a capital nature, as well as fertilisers, seed wheat etc. for cropping purposes. Wages for farm-help was also provided by the Department.
5. All revenue from the farming activities was credited to a bank account in the name of the Committee and the funds acquired were used exclusively to further agricultural education at the schools.
6. The Head of the School was a Committee member and the Superintendent of Agricultural Education frequently attended Committee meetings.

In conclusion, Mr Barton said that the representatives of the Education Department sought Treasury clarification as to whether the financial procedures with these schools were in order.

In reply Messrs McCarrey and Hewitt made the following points:

- (a) The guidance and controlling influence of practical farmers were essential if Agricultural Education were to proceed along correct lines.
- (b) They looked upon the Committees as being comparable with Parents and Citizens' Associations and drew a parallel with canteen activities.
- (c) The amounts allocated in the Annual Estimates were to assist with Agricultural Education and provided it was spent for this purpose there could be no criticism from any quarter.
- (d) They had no objection to the revenue from the farming activities being paid into a bank account in the name of the Advisory Committee.
- (e) They agreed that the funds acquired could be spent at the discretion of the Committee provided they were expended on school farming activities. In this regard there was some control as the Head of the school was a Committee member.

(f) *They could not see that the procedures in any way flouted Audit requirements.*

It was finally agreed that from a Treasury angle the Education Department should continue to run agricultural education along the present lines.

The formation of each of these Advisory Committees is described in the following pages:

8.2.2 Mount Barker

On November 8th 1961, Mr J H Barton visited Mount Barker and conferred with the representatives nominated by the Minister for Education, Mr A F Watts, member for Mount Barker. They were Messrs W T Frost of Kendenup, A M Wright of Mount Barker and N Pearce of Woogenellup. It was decided that day instruction be offered in agricultural subjects on the land surrounding the new high school, over 300 acres, and it was recommended that an advisory committee be formed. There was a slight delay as the property had been leased to a local farmer (Mr Haese) for grazing.

In due course on 14th March 1962 the following gentlemen were invited by the Hon. Minister to form the Advisory Committee:
Messrs W T Frost, A M Wright, N Pearce, C B Mitchell, E Skinner, F Force and D Ford.

8.2.3 Morawa

On 5th April 1964, Mr J H Barton visited Morawa Junior High School to discuss agricultural education. An agricultural committee was already in existence at the school mainly concerned with cropping available land for the benefit of school funds. After meeting with this committee a recommendation was made that the Hon. Minister be asked to form an Agricultural Advisory Committee which be granted a lease of the school land of 200 acres and be given some financial assistance with its cropping.

The Minister approved and on 22nd April invited the following gentlemen to form the Committee: P Milloy, L J Broad, E Lawrence, N Croot, R Tubby, G Croot, A Eaton, G Carslake, R Carslake, J Osborne and J Heitman, M.L.C. All accepted.

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8.2.4 Manjimup

The Parents and Citizens' Association reminded the Hon. Minister on 8th March, 1965 that the Education Department had promised that the 45 acres of land held for Agricultural purposes was to be managed by an agricultural committee. Immediate action by the Department resulted in the Hon. Minister on 30th March inviting Messrs L R Beard, B W Sealey, J C Waugh, E G Stephenson, M Finch and R Pozzi to form the Agricultural Advisory Committee with assistance from Department of Agriculture officers.

8.2.5 Margaret River

The erection of a new Junior High School at Margaret River on a large piece of land on the southern edge of the town brought on a considerable amount of community interest in some form of agricultural education and within a couple of years, by 1956, this had commenced.

In 1966, Mr J H Barton wrote to the Director-General,

"Although the day attendance course in agriculture has been in operation for some years, an Advisory Committee has never been appointed.

A committee was not appointed because the day attendance type of instruction was in the experimental stages. It was considered desirable to develop and consolidate this type of training entirely within Departmental control.

Development at Margaret River High School is now at a stage when the work will profit from the assistance of an Advisory Committee."

On 23rd May 1966, the Minister for Education invited Messrs C W Furniss, R C Stockdill, G D Penfold and K Hawley of the Department of Agriculture to form a Committee and all accepted.

8.2.8 Esperance

In August, 1960, the Neridup Location 233 of 1830 acres was reluctantly accepted by the Education Department as *"an area of land in close proximity to Esperance for a future agricultural school for use in conjunction with the Esperance High School."* It was 16 miles east of Esperance and hence the rider,

"Should a suitable location nearer to Esperance town site become available in the future, consideration will be given to its reservation in lieu of Location 233."

In March, 1963, Mr G D Macalpine, for a committee for an "Agricultural Training Centre" offered the Department the services of farmers adjacent to the school block to clear it and bring it to pasture if the Department would supply materials. The Minister was not inclined to proceed in Esperance so soon. The Superintendent, Mr Barton could only see worth in the proposal if the land were prepared for a more advantageous exchange later. The Esperance residents were informed that expenditure could not be approved on the new land.

On 5th September, 1963, Mr Fred de Grussa called on the Minister to endeavour to stimulate some action at Esperance, to effect an exchange or get on with Lot 233. The Department was relenting by April 1964 as a result of continued representations and evidence from Mr de Grussa, they agreed to Mr Macalpines 1963 proposals.

On May 29th, 1964, Esperance Junior High School Headmaster, Allan Jones, called a public meeting to plan and prepare the school land. A committee was elected to handle the matter in detail: Mr F de Grussa, President, and Messrs H Browning, E J Southall, G D Macalpine and B Norris.

The Education Department approved the committee and their proposals and recognised that Mr de Grussa should continue as Chairman despite a convention that the Principal of the school should occupy this position.

On 23rd October, 1964 the Minister invited Messrs de Grussa, H Browning, G D Macalpine, B Norris and E J Southall to form the High School Agricultural Advisory Committee. All accepted.
